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

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Federal Requirements of State Guidelines Reviews and State Guidelines

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Federal Requirements of Reviews (45 C.F.R 302.56 (e) and (h))

(e) The State must review, and revise, if appropriate, the child support guidelines established under paragraph (a) of this section at least once every four years to ensure that their application results in the determination of appropriate child support order amounts. The State shall publish on the internet and make accessible to the public all reports of the guidelines reviewing body, the membership of the reviewing body, the effective date of the guidelines, and the date of the next quadrennial review.

(h)As part of the review of a State's child support guidelines required under paragraph (e) of this section, a State must:

(1) Consider economic data on the cost of raising children, labor market data (such as unemployment rates, employment rates, hours worked, and earnings) by occupation and skill-level for the State and local job markets, the impact of guidelines policies and amounts on custodial and noncustodial parents who have family incomes below 200 percent of the Federal poverty level, and factors that influence employment rates among noncustodial parents and compliance with child support orders;

(2) Analyze case data, gathered through sampling or other methods, on the application of and deviations from the child support guidelines, as well as the rates of default and imputed child support orders and orders determined using the low-income adjustment required under paragraph (c)(1)(ii) of this section. The analysis must also include a comparison of payments on child support orders by case characteristics, including whether the order was entered by default, based on imputed income, or determined using the low-income adjustment required under paragraph (c)(1)(ii). The analysis of the data must be used in the State's review of the child support guidelines to ensure that deviations from the guidelines are limited and guideline amounts are appropriate based on criteria established by the State under paragraph (g); and

(3)Provide a meaningful opportunity for public input, including input from low-income custodial and noncustodial parents and their representatives. The State must also obtain the views and advice of the State child support agency funded under title IV–D of the Act.

- (b) The State must have procedures for making the guidelines available to all persons in the State.
- (c) The child support guidelines established under paragraph (a) of this section must at a minimum:


 (1) Provide that the child support order is based on the noncustodial parent's earnings, income, and other evidence of ability to pay that:
 - (I) Takes into consideration all earnings and income of the noncustodial parent (and at the State's discretion, the custodial parent);

(ii) Takes into consideration the basic subsistence needs of the noncustodial parent (and at the State's discretion, the custodial parent and children) who has a limited ability to pay by incorporating a low-income adjustment, such as a self- support reserve or some other method determined by the State; and
(iii) If imputation of income is authorized, takes into consideration the specific circumstances of the noncustodial parent (and at the State's discretion, the custodial

parent) to the extent known, including such factors as the noncustodial parent's assets, residence, employment and earnings history, job skills, educational attainment, literacy, age, health, criminal record and other employment barriers, and record of seeking work, as well as the local job market, the availability of employers willing to hire the noncustodial parent, prevailing earnings level in the local community, and other relevant background factors in the case.

(2) Address how the parents will provide for the child's health care needs through private or public health care coverage and/or through cash medical support;

- (3) Provide that incarceration may not be treated as voluntary unemployment in establishing or modifying support orders; and
- (4) Be based on specific descriptive and numeric criteria and result in a computation of the child support obligation.

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Child Support Schedules Are Part Economic Data and Part Policy

Things in blue are what can be updated if no major change in assumptions

· Relate to estimates of child-rearing expenditures


- No new studies since last review except FL study that is not used by any state
- · Adjustments are made to those estimates:
 - · Update to current price levels due to data lags
 - Update to most current federal and state income tax rates and FICA
 - · Possibly update for changes in the income/price gap between Alabama and US average
 - Relate to after-tax income rather than family expenditures (i.e., factor in average household savings, donations, and other expenditures outside the home)
 - Exclude childcare expenses and the child's healthcare costs except for up to the first \$250 per child per year (update how we separate cost for child healthcare and adult healthcare)

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Next Steps and Questions

CPR AND DHR

- · Obtain data extract to meet federal data requirements
- Develop standard data extract, dictionary, and analysis for trend analysis for each quadrennial review
- · Targeted timeline: early 2025

CPR

- · Prepare updated, baseline schedule using same assumptions but more current economic data
- Targeted timeline: Mid-Feb 2025 (January 2025 price levels will be available)

Committee

- Besides case file data, what other information is useful when reviewing potential updates to the schedule and SSR adjustment?
- · What other guidelines provisions should be reviewed or considered?
- Besides the federal data requirements, what case file data should be tracked over time and how should it be analyzed/reported (e.g., median amount/ranges; analysis of particular subgroups)?
